MINUTES OF THE 88TH ANNUAL MEETING OF MCDONOUGH POWER COOPERATIVE

The 88th Annual Meeting of the Members of the McDonough Power Cooperative was held at The Crossing in Macomb, Illinois at 6:30 PM on Wednesday, August 13, 2025.

Registration began at 5:00 PM and Board Chairman Walter Lewis called the meeting to order at 6:30 PM. President Mike Smith gave the invocation, which was followed by the presentation of colors by Boy Scout Troop #315, the Pledge of Allegiance and a National Anthem video.

Chairman Lewis began the meeting by introducing the members of the McDonough Power Board of Directors, the Cooperative Attorney and CEO and their spouses. Chairman Lewis stated that the Cooperative bylaws require at least 1% of the Cooperative Members to be present for a quorum. As of 6:30 PM, registration showed 272 registered Members and Chairman Lewis declared a quorum present.

Chairman Lewis introduced Board Secretary, Steve Hall, who read the official notice of the meeting. The Notice was mailed on July 30, 2025 to 3,450 Members. Steve noted that the 2024 annual membership meeting minutes are contained verbatim in the notice of the meeting mailed to the Members and asked if any Member would like to have the minutes read. In the absence of a request for the reading of the minutes, Chairman Lewis requested and received a motion to approve the minutes as printed, which passed without objection on a voice vote.

Chairman Lewis introduced Treasurer, Mike Cox, who gave the Treasurer's Report and referred the Members to the printed report in the Annual Meeting Notice, showing all revenue and expenses for the 2024 calendar year and the balance sheet as of December 31, 2024. Treasurer Cox noted that the financial records of the Cooperative were audited by the accounting firm of Kelso Lynch and recommended

approval of the Treasurer's Report. Chairman Lewis requested a motion to approve the Treasurer's Report. Upon motion made, seconded and a voice vote, the Treasurer's report was approved.

Chairman Lewis introduced Terry Thompson, who served as Chairperson of this year's Nominating Committee. Terry made his report on the Nominating Committee meeting, including the date of the meeting, the members in attendance, and the candidates nominated by the Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee nominated Mike Cox as the candidate for Director from District 1, Walter Lewis as the candidate for Director from District 3 and Steve Hall as the candidate for Director from District 7, each to be elected to serve a three-year term.

At the conclusion of his report, Terry turned the meeting over to Cooperative Attorney, John McMillan. Attorney McMillan reported that the Cooperative did not receive any nominations by petition this year and then requested and received a motion to close nominations and have the three nominees elected by unanimous ballot, to serve their three-year terms. Upon receiving a second to the motion, and a voice vote in favor of the motion, John declared the three nominees elected to the Board.

Chairman Lewis thanked the members for attending their annual meeting and began his report by thanking people who helped put the program together. Chairman Lewis then discussed the cooperative's financials for 2024 and 2025 that show the cooperative is on strong financial footing. He also discussed the update to the new software McDonough Power is transitioning to that will provide for updated billing, and an app that can allow for payment of bills and potential outage notifications. Chairman Lewis closed out his report by stressing the cooperative's continued improvements both in the office and out in the field.

Chairman Lewis turned the meeting over to President Mike Smith. President Smith began his report by introducing the Operation Round-Up Trustees and thanked them for their service. He also introduced special guests of the Cooperative who were in attendance and then introduced all of the Cooperative employees.

President Smith presented the 2025 service awards, being a 5-year service award to Riley Entwistle, 15-year service award to Joe Wernsman, 20-year service awards to Bob Dwyer and Clay Wiemerslage, and a 30-year service award to Mike Cox. The final service award went to Doug Bear for 35 years of service.

President Smith's report began with a discussion on cooperative principles. He highlighted that it has been a busy year and provided more information regarding the new software being implemented. He also discussed the upcoming capital credit payouts as well as new transmission lines from PPI. President Smith then asked Eric Hobbie,

CEO and President of Prairie Power, to join him on the stage, where he and Eric discussed changes in the power supply side of the electric energy world and anticipated future rate hikes. They discussed how the deregulation of the power supply side of the industry has led to increased shortages and potential rolling blackouts. President Smith and Eric discussed the role of energy generation, both for Prairie Power and other energy producers. They also discussed MISO (Midcontinent Independent System Operator) and how it was set up to provide transparency, not to build generation. They also discussed the transmission side of the business and how supply chain issues have increased the cost of materials. In general, the continued closing of coal-fired power plants and the conversion to natural gas, solar and wind will likely lead to higher costs and inadequate supply.

President Smith supervised the drawing for door prizes, including the three grand prizes of a \$250 credit on the Member's September electric bill. Grand prize winners were Martin Kimberlee, Michael Conner, and Beverly Lutz. Several door prizes were also given out.

President Smith thanked the members for attending the Annual Meeting and the meeting was adjourned.
